ARPA Money Will Bolster Ada County Pay Policies for Departments Directly and Adversely Impacted By COVID-19

Ada County Commissioners are working to ensure that the business of the county is carried out efficiently for residents who count on critically important services provided each day to our community. That's why the Board of Commissioners approved spending American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) money to supplement pay for key staff at the Ada County Coroner's **Office, Ada County Emergency Medical Services** (EMS) and the Ada County Sheriff's Office Health Services Unit. Staff in each of these areas is experiencing the extraordinary impacts of COVID-19.

"The lifesaving work our staff continues to provide during the pandemic has been extraordinary," said Ada County Paramedics Chief Shawn Rayne. "Despite the personal toll of having to work countless extra shifts under incredibly trying circumstances, everyone at Ada County Paramedics stepped up and gave extra effort. We continue to respond to every call, day and night, no matter the emergency circumstances because that's who we are. We deeply appreciate the support from the Board of County Commissioners." "Having a robust nursing staff is vitally important for our agency, and these bonuses should help us compete in a tough marketplace," Ada County Sheriff Matt Clifford said. "Our Health Services Unit works incredibly hard to take care of an inmate

population that may not have regular access to health care. This is an investment that benefits our entire community."

According to the U.S. Treasury, the American Rescue Plan is delivering \$350 billion to state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments to ameliorate the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

In the coming months the Ada County Board of Commissioners will consider requests for investment of ARPA funds in myriad projects across Ada County made necessary by the pandemic. County officials will propose using these federal funds to make improvements to county facilities and operations that would otherwise be funded with tax dollars.





A new 11,000 square foot Driver's License Office is now open in Meridian at 736 S. Progress Avenue. The new office is centrally located not far from the Meridian Exit on I-84 and will better serve Ada County residents who live in the western part of the county.

The location operates by Appointment Only and provides a variety of services to Ada County residents. You can get your Commercial License, STAR Card, renew your Driver's License, or if you're new to Idaho, get your Idaho Driver's License. It's important to remember – in Idaho, the DMV and the Driver's License Office provide two different services.

Congratulations to the Ada County Sheriff's Office for providing this new location to Ada County Residents, and to the Ada County Commissioners for securing the funding.

MONOCLONAL ANTIBODY TREATMENT(mAb)

The best protection against COVID-19 is getting vaccinated. Treatments can provide an "airbag", but vaccines are your "seatbelt".

HOW CAN I GET THE MONOCLONAL **ANTIBODY TREATMENT?**

Monoclonal antibody treatments can be prescribed by health care providers to those who meet the following criteria:

- Are 12 years of age and older.
- Have tested positive for
- COVID-19 in the last 10 days. Are experiencing mild to
- moderate symptoms. Are at high risk for more

serious symptoms. If you do not have a healthcare

provider, call the Combat COVID Monoclonal Antibodies Call Center at 1-877-332-6585.

WHAT IS MONOCLONAL **ANTIBODY TREATMENT?**



The FDA issued this emergency use investigational treatment to aid those people at high risk of disease progression.

Antibodies are administered, within 10 days of symptom onset, that attach to parts of the virus and help the immune system respond.

HOW IDAHO IS UTILIZING THIS TREATMENT?




Idaho is launching three monoclonal antibody treatment centers. They are located in North Idaho and Eastern Idaho. A center is being set up in the Treasure Valley.





If your home falls in one of 2022's reappraisal areas, you may have also received a postcard requesting your participation in an on-line reappraisal survey. Just follow the instructions on the postcard to log your survey responses. We appreciate your participation in the Assessor's effort to gather and maintain accurate property data. Please visit www.adacounty.id.gov/assessor for more detailed information and answers to your reappraisal FAQs.

Office!

State law requires every parcel in the county be physically re-inspected once every five years, and your property could be within an area up for reappraisal for 2022. Someone from the Assessor's Office might be in your neighborhood gathering data and taking updated photos of your property.
