







Youth Demographics 2022 (529 participating youth)










Recidivism


We use Idaho's statewide definition of recidivism for youth who successfully complete Ada County's diversion program, which defines recidivism as being adjudicated or convicted of a new felony or misdemeanor.

To evaluate additional involvement in the criminal justice system, we counted any new or pending adjudication or conviction after the date of successful diversion closure. Juvenile adjudications were identified by a new probation/IA term in IJOS and for youth older than 18, adult convictions by a new case in iCourts not including infractions or misdemeanor traffic offenses. Date of the associated offense (not the filing, adjudication or conviction date) was used to calculate time to re-offend.
