PROJECT OVERVIEW

The project consists of building a new emergency medical response station for the Ada County Paramedics. It is the second construction project for the new Meridian Campus. The facility has been specifically designed and tailored, based on work flow analysis, to meet the needs of the entire department.

Ada County Paramedics provide advanced life support services around the clock to over 361,500 residents of Boise, Meridian, Garden City, Eagle, Star, Kuna, and rural Ada County. ACP is an emergency service dispatched by the county's 9-1-1 communications center, just like area law enforcement.

The new facility will be LEED Certified by the US Green Building Council. LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) is a national rating system used to develop high-performance, sustainable buildings. LEED emphasizes state-of-theart strategies for site development, water savings, energy efficiency, materials selection, and indoor environmental quality.
